The Association of Retired School Employees (L'ARSE) and Lester B. Pearson School Board (LBPSB) agree that L'ARSE will be endorsed as the official association for retired employees of the LBPSB as of September 24, 2018. This agreement:

- a) Provides a protocol that will allow the Board's Human Resources department to inform retirees of this agreement, its benefit and, if authorized, to share their personal information with the Association;
- b) Makes sure that an Association representative attends and briefly addresses the new retirees at their gala formally welcoming them to "their" association;
- c) Offers rooms and venues that are normally available to the public for a fee, to the Association free of charge, as long as extra caretaking expenses are not incurred;
- d) Offers at "cost only", the same rooms and venues, including venues under entente
 with municipalities, if other significant expenses must be covered: utilities and
 caretaking;
- e) Allows the Association website link to be visible on the Board's website;
- f) Commits the School Board to design a portal where retirees, schools and centers will be able to connect regarding: volunteer opportunities and mentorship.

Book Club I

The Original Book Club

We have no script for the year, just plan from month to month, but we never have trouble coming up with interesting books! Below are our selections from February to May.

In this year's *Canada Reads* competition, <u>What Strange Paradise</u>, by Omar El Akkad, was championed by Tarek Hadad, founder of Peace by Chocolate, who felt that all Canadians should read it in order to grasp what it's like to be a refugee. In the opening scene, the shore of a Greek island is littered with the bodies of migrants who drowned trying to cross the Mediterranean Sea from Africa. One boy comes to life, gets up, and runs. We follow his panicked flight as he tries to evade capture as an illegal immigrant. In a system of brutality and pitilessness, he finds a few people capable of extraordinary kindness, particularly one teenaged girl. Interspersed with the chapters on the island are others occurring before he left on the voyage and, especially harrowing to read, during the perilous crossing of the sea.

<u>Fight Night</u> is the story Miriam Toews wrote to help her own family members come to terms with the mental illness seemingly carried in their genes. In the book, a grandmother, her middle-aged daughter, and her young granddaughter live together in a small apartment. The daughter, pregnant and alone, her partner having disappeared, struggles with depression while trying to find acting jobs to keep the family afloat. The young girl, who has been suspended from school for bad behaviour of some kind, spends her days tending to her aged grandmother. If this sounds like a depressing tale, it isn't. Parts of it are hilarious! The grandmother may suffer from a myriad of physical ailments, but she is an unforgettable life force, and the strong bond between her and her granddaughter is the heart of the book.

<u>Pachinko</u>, by Min Jin Lee, is an epic historical fiction novel following a Korean family who emigrate to Japan, where their people encounter discrimination, stereotyping, and exploitation. The time frame spans from 1910 to 1989, which includes the Japanese Occupation of Korea and the Second World War. The novel highlights the motif of pachinko, a recreational arcade game not unlike pinball, whose unpredictable and uncontrollable nature is a metaphor for the randomness of the characters' lives. This interesting family saga was, for most of us, also an introduction to a chapter of history with which we were unfamiliar.

<u>All the Rivers</u>, written by Dorit Rabinyan, has the dubious distinction of being the first book ever banned from Israel's high school curricula. The novel, which is set mainly in New York City, chronicles a passionate but ill-starred love affair between a Palestinian artist and an Israeli translator. What makes the story even more interesting to read is the fact that the plot largely follows the direction taken by the author's own life, as she had a similarly fraught romance. Besides being a heart-rending story, this book is beautifully written!

Our up-coming book is When We Lost Our Heads, by Heather O'Neill. It's the tale of two girls whose friendship is so intense that it not only threatens to destroy them, it changes the trajectory of history. Marie Antoine, the spoiled daughter of a sugar baron, has everything she wants except a best friend - that is until clever, scheming Sadie Arnett moves into the neighbourhood and everything changes. Soon their childlike games take on the thrill of danger and then become deadly. Heather O'Neill never disappoints!

Book Club Two ended the year with *Fight Night* by Miriam Toews. Shortlisted for the Scotiabank Giller Prize, it is told in the voice of Swiv who lives in Toronto with her grandmother and pregnant mother. It is full of love, laughter and sometimes pain, a story of living a life on one's own terms and of fighting to the end.

We zoomed into January (with thanks again to our host Jan Murray) with the novel *Undersong* by Kathleen Winter. It is the story of Dorothy Wordsworth, sister of William, who is a writer in her own right. It is a book about language, atmosphere and relationships and the effect one life can have on another.

In February we read *A Net for Small Fishes* by Lucy Jago. Set in the court of James I of Scotland and England, it is a blend of fact and fiction, telling a tale of power and scandal. Next we tackled *Cloud Cuckoo Land*, a brilliant novel by Anthony Doerr. It creates a magnificent tapestry of interconnected time and place from ancient Constantinople to the present and to the future. Dedicated to "librarians then, now and years to come" it is a novel about redemption of the earth and of the human heart. A must read. These novels sustained us throughout the long, cold winter.

Our April read was *Fresh Water for Flowers* by Valerie Perrin. The main character is the caretaker of a cemetery and leads a cast of wonderful characters. It is a poignant, moving and intimately-told story of relationships, generosity and the power of love.

May's read was Heather O'Neill's When We Lost our Heads. Heather O'Neill is a Montreal writer whose novels are set in Mile End. This is a departure from her usual. Set in The Square Mile and what she calls The Squalid Mile in the late nine-teenth century, it is a spellbinding story of two women whose friendship is so intense it threatens to destroy them. It explores power, greed, gender, sex, desire, class and status. A "juicy read" as one of our members said. Up next is *The Reading List* Sara Nisha Adams.

Crafting Corner


A warm invitation to all new retirees: if you have any favorite creative or artistic hobbies, now is the time to share them through chatting and photos.



GOLFREPORT



We have close to 70 members registered with, on average, 20 participating every week. The 18-hole group plays every Monday while the 9 holers play every second Monday. Our abilities vary greatly and everyone is able to fit in. This is a fun group to play with and we'd be delighted to have you join us. The golf is low key and the company excellent. With this group you will see the good, the bad and the downright ugly.

We always have room for new members.

Weather permitting, we tend to stay for an adult beverage or two after the round. Our first game of the 18-hole 2022 golf season was May 2nd at Golf Dorval and our last game will be at on Oct. 31st. We played on courses ranging from Lachute to Hawkesbury, Terrebonne to the U.S. border and all places in between. Once a month we have a nine hole outing on the same day as the 18 hole group but at a different location. Last year we have played Mystic Pines, Mohawk Hills and Métropolitain. We also have one day per month where we play both nine and eighteen holes at Golf Dorval with tee times arranged so that we can all have a drink together after.

The highlight of our year is "The Schools Open Open" which will be held at Golf Dorval on August 30th, the day that students return to classes. This is usually followed by a "gala" dinner but with Covid-19 restrictions, this has been low key the last two years.

Our virtual indoor season usually begins in December and we play every Monday until the following summer season is ready to go. This last season we played most of our games at Le Golf Club's T.M.R. location. We usually get together for lunch afterwards to discuss the important issues of the day.

Cyclopaths

Cyclopaths is a name chosen a few years ago by this group of recreational cyclists which has been operating since last century, almost since the inception of L'ARSE. We have been operating since the beginning of April, gradually increasing in number of cyclists as the temperatures rise. We welcome new members to this non-competitive activity.

So far this season, the group has averaged around 10 participants, a number that will likely grow as the weather improves over the summer and COVID 19 restrictions ease. However, variations in members' travel vacations usually helps to keep group size reasonable. So far, the largest number of trip participants was about 20.

Tuesdays are the usual days for cycling trips, but we cannot always count on ideal weather every Tuesday of the month. Longer-term weather forecasting has improved over the years; however, surprises have happened. E-mail notifications of forthcoming trips usually appear on a preceding Sunday or Monday, based on these forecasts, distances usually vary from 20 to 50 kilometres, gradually working up to the longer trips over time.

This is not a racing club, there are enough of those around already. Our speeds probably average around 15-18 kilometres per hour, roughly 3 times a brisk walking pace.

Our focus is on exercise in a pleasurable group. Physical distancing is almost a given which makes cycling an ideal option to maintain fitness during this pandemic. The psychological boost from this opportunity for safe socialization has been a welcome additional benefit releasing us from the isolation many of us have been experiencing.
